Plan Ahead to Make the Most of Conference Education

hen you open the Conference Education Brochure, the number of education opportunities scheduled throughout the five days of Conference can be shocking. With a little planning, though, you can maximize your educational experience in New Orleans.

The best piece of advice is to choose which sessions that you would like to attend before arriving in New Orleans. A few months ago, you should have received the Conference Education Brochure. You can also view this brochure online at www.cmaa.org/template.aspx?id=23266. Take a few minutes to read the description of each of the programs and decide which ones you want to attend. If you wait until five minutes before the sessions begin before reviewing your options, you are more likely to miss some interesting sessions in your haste to just find something to go to. The Conference Education Brochure lists the learning objectives for each session as well as the competency area each session covers.

Once you have determined which sessions you would like to attend, you can print out the materials for the sessions at home. The Proceedings Manual is available online at www.cmaa.org beginning January 1, 2009. All Conference attendees will receive a CD of the manual on site in New Orleans, but there will be limited venues to print the materials. You don't want to miss a portion of a session because you were waiting in line to print handouts. Print them at home and bring them with you to save time.

Conference provides an excellent opportunity to earn valuable CMI Education credits toward your Certified Club Manager (CCM) eligibility or your Certification Maintenance Requirement (CMR). Plan on attending every



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available educational timeslot. The majority of the sessions are 90 minutes in length so they are worth 1.5 CMI credits. There are a few one- and three-hour sessions that are worth 1.0 and 3.0 CMI credits respectively. You are investing a lot of time and resources to attend Conference, so why not make every minute count? Conference attendees have the opportunity to earn 24 CMI credits if they attend every educational timeslot.

If you happen to miss something that a speaker said during a session, don't worry! All attendees who registered under the "Full Conference" or "Education Only" categories will receive a full set of the audio recordings of most of the sessions. If you have any questions while at the Marriott, the entire CMAA Education Department will be in New Orleans. Please feel free to visit the Education Office, which will be in the Regent Room on the $4^{\rm th}$ Floor of the Marriott.

Just remember, this is your Conference. With a little planning, you can make it one of the best Conferences ever.

n September 2003, CMAA signed an Alliance with OSHA to promote safe and healthful working conditions for membership club employees in the areas of hazard communication, recordkeeping and respiratory protection. In February 2005, CMAA renewed its Alliance and added a new scope of concentration, landscaping and horticulture. The Alliance was again renewed in October 2007. the basic building blocks for the beginning of a club-wide focus on safety. However, it is just a start. Safety, like many other aspects in a club, must be a daily focus of the management and employees. Complacency is not an option where safety is involved.

CMAA has developed a clubspecific OSHA resource Web site at www.cmaa.org/template.aspx?id=20424. Topics include general tools and resources, consultation resources, online safety management tools, hazard communications (HAZCOM), recordkeeping, respiratory protection, landscaping and horticulture, motor vehicle safety, employees with limited English proficiency, working outdoors, workplace emergencies, disaster recovery, workplace inspections, workplace violence, and youth workers. The Web site also includes this article series as well as the OSHA and CMAA Alliance-developed Toolbox Talks for the Club Industry.

In addition to bookmarking www.cmaa.org/template.aspx?id=20424 and visiting the site often, I urge you to make your employees aware of the site and encourage them to visit it as you work together to keep safety a primary focus for your club's workforce.
